
Saint Charles Lwanga and Companions (Martyrs) Wednesday 3 June



Saint Charles Lwanga and Companions

Saint Charles Lwanga (1860/1865-1886) along with twenty-two companions is considered to be a proto-martyr and is one of the first African martyrs. Saint Charles served the Ugandan king (kababka) as master of pages. This job mainly involved training young people for military service. He carried out this job during the reign of Mwanga who was anti-Christian. Saint Charles (who had recently converted to the Catholic faith) felt compelled to catechize the young pages in his charge in the ways of Christianity, which led to several baptisms. These baptisms sadly did not please king Mwanga and he asked Saint Charles and his companions to renounce the faith but they refused. They remained faithful to Christ. Saint Charles and his companions were arrested and sentenced to death.


What can we learn from Saint Charles Lwanga and his companions?

Saint Charles lived out his faith in Christ no matter where he was. He didn't let his work interfere with his faith, and he lived out his faith in practical ways. The same can be said for us.

When we live out our faith sincerely, joyfully and meaningfully with love, others may come to know Jesus. The Gospel today is of the Beatitudes which could be considered our roadmap for living as a Christian no matter what we are faced with, just like Saint Charles.

theirs is the kingdom of heaven.


'Happy are you when people abuse you and persecute you and speak all kinds of calumny against you on my account.
