

#### About Saint Bonaventura - 1218 - 1274

Bonaventure was born at Bagnoregio in Etruria in about 1218. He became a Franciscan friar in 1243 and studied philosophy and theology at the University of Paris. He became a famous teacher and philosopher. He was a friend and colleague of St Thomas Aquinas.

During Bonaventure's lifetime the Franciscan friars were still a new and revolutionary force in the Church, and their way of embracing poverty, coupled with their rejection of institutional structures, raised suspicion and opposition from many.

Bonaventure was elected general of the order in 1255, and he ruled it with wisdom and prudence, which allowed him to heal many divisions within the Order. He is regarded as the second founder of the Order.

He declined the see of York in 1265 but was made cardinal bishop of Albano in 1273 and died a year later in 1274 at the Council of Lyons, at which the Greek and Latin churches were (briefly) reconciled.

Bonaventure is remembered as teacher and for his extensive biblical and mystical writings as well as for his holiness, gentleness and compassion.

He was declared a Doctor of the Church in 1588 by Pope Sixtus V.

#### What can we learn from Saint Bonaventura's life?

Bonaventure was an academic, who wrote extensively on philosophy and theology, thereby making a permanent mark on intellectual history. However, he was a "down-to-earth" man who was humble. He always insisted that simple and uneducated people could have a clearer knowledge of God than the wise. The lesson we can learn here is that we must be open to people's gifts and talents and finding out what they are. So often we may not take the time to get to know people and we could be missing a golden opportunity to make a new friendship and tap into what the Lord has blessed someone with. We like people to afford us a chance to get to know us and so we must do that for others as well. As the saying goes: "never judge a book by its cover."

Humility is a wonderful virtue that we should let blossom in our lives.
