Saint Denis (Martyr) 7 October



About Saint Denis [- 258]

Like so many saints from the early Church, we don't have a lot of concrete facts about Saint Denis. He was the bishop of Paris during the third century. He was martyred during the persecution of the Emperor Decius.

We understand that he came to Gaul from Rome, settling in Paris on the Ile de la Cité in the River Seine, where he built a church, arranged the regular celebration of Mass, and preached the Gospel. According to Saint Gregory of Tours, Saint Denis was beheaded with a sword on Montmartre, the highest hill in Paris, which may have been a Druidic holy place. Local tradition holds that the martyrdom of Saint Denis gave the hill its name.

After his death, his body and those of his companions, Saints Eleutherius and Rusticus (who were also clergymen), were recovered by the Christian community and buried.

Since Saint Denis was martyred with a beheading, he is often portrayed decapitated, vested in bishops vestments and holding his own head.

He is the patron saint of France, the city of Paris. He is invoked against headaches, rabies and demonic possession.

What can we learn from Saint Denis' life?

Although we do not know a great deal about Saint Denis and his companions, we do know that he left his homeland to preach the Gospel. We also know that he organized the Church in Paris and that he was unwavering in his faith.

Let us not pass by an opportunity to proclaim the Gospel. We can do this in a variety of ways, but mostly by our kind words and good actions, will people know that we love Christ and our neighbour.

O God, who sent Saint Denis and his companions to preach your glory to the nations and strengthened them for their mission with the virtue of constancy in suffering, grant, we pray, that we may imitate them in disdaining prosperity in this world and in being undaunted by any trial.
