

## What is Children's Liturgy of the Word?

Making the Word of God from the liturgy of the Sunday accessible to children.

### Chapter 2 Masses With Adults in Which Children Also Participate

17. Nevertheless, in Masses of this kind it is necessary to take great care that the children present do not feel neglected because of their inability to participate or to understand what happens and what is proclaimed in the celebration. Some account should be taken of their presence: for example, by speaking to them directly in the introductory comments (as at the beginning and the end of Mass) and at some point in the homily.

Sometimes, moreover, if the place itself and the nature of the community permit, it will be appropriate to celebrate the Liturgy of the Word, including a homily, with the children in a separate, but not too distant, room. Then, before the Eucharistic Liturgy begins, the children are led to the place where the adults have meanwhile celebrated their own Liturgy of the Word.


Children's Liturgy of the Word is part of the Mass and is only separate in its location.

- It is most appropriate that the Gathering, Entrance and Greeting, is carried out with the
- entire community, adults and children present.
- The breakaway from the adult community must be visible and carried out with a certain dignity.
- The children are sent out to their meeting place to participate in a Children's Liturgy of the Word where the word of God is proclaimed and broken open for them at an age appropriate level.
- The children re-join the main assembly after the Prayer of the Faithful.
- Liaison between the Children's Liturgy of the Word team and the priest is necessary so that the departure and return of the children is reverent and easy for all.

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# The Importance of Gospel Reflection in Children's Liturgy of the Word Preparation.

The theme of the Sunday Eucharist is taken from the Gospel of that Sunday. A central part of the preparation of the Children's Liturgy of the Word is to reflect on the Gospel. The Opening prayer, songs and Breaking Open the Word are also prepared to support the central message of the Gospel of a given Sunday.

Consult some resources to better understand the message of the Gospel, and ways to communicate this message to children at their level.

#### Decide on the Theme

- The theme is only a few words.
- Keep it simple.
- Make it visual.
- Help children remember the message.
