INTRODUCTION

Welcome to Lent! By the time this Newsletter is published we will be almost at the end of the first week of Lent. Since we are now in the thick of Lent, I thought I would repeat my notes on Lent from the February Newsletter.

As Lent is a penitential season, the music we prepare for the liturgy during Lent should reflect this characteristic. Musical instruments should only be used to sustain the singing with the exception of the Solemnities of Saint Patrick (Friday 17 March), Saint Joseph (Monday 20 March) and the Annunciation (Saturday 25 March) as well as the Fourth Sunday of Lent (*Laetare Sunday* – Sunday 19 March). (GIRM 313)

Given that musical instruments are to be used only to sustain the singing with the exception of the days mentioned in the previous paragraph, another way we can observe the simplicity of Lent in the liturgy is to not sing a recessional hymn but let the ministers of the liturgy and then the members of the gathered assembly depart in silence.

In Lent, the Alleluia is omitted at Mass and in the Liturgy of the Hours, even in the celebrations of solemnities and feasts. This also applies to the hymns used in the Liturgy. The Gospel Acclamation is replaced by one of these four acclamations (GIRM 62a-b):

- -Praise to You, Lord Jesus Christ, King of endless glory!
- -Praise and honour to You, Lord Jesus Christ!
- -Glory and praise to You, Lord Jesus Christ!
- -Glory to You, Word of God, Lord Jesus Christ!

(CWB II contains various settings of these acclamations. (Numbers 54-61))

Parishes with an active RCIA process should celebrate the Scrutinies on the Third, Fourth and Fifth Sundays of Lent. Suggestions for appropriate music are made in the hymn suggestions for those Sundays of Lent. (See pages 14-19.)

In the section on hymn suggestions, I have included hymn suggestions for the Sundays in April. Palm Sunday falls on Sunday 2 April and Easter Sunday falls on Sunday 9 April. I have not included any musical suggestions for the liturgies of Holy

Week. The hymnals have indices which cover Holy Week adequately, in particular CWB II (see Numbers 302-345). The Holy Week liturgies are very complex and there are several rituals within each liturgy. This is where CWB II is extremely helpful because it has music for each of these rituals.

There are a couple of points I would like to draw your attention to with regards to music for Holy Week. Alongside CWB II, the ICEL website contains the melodies for the Chants in the Holy Week Missal.

Another point to note is that the Sequence is obligatory on Easter Sunday. There is a Gregorian Chant setting in both English and Latin in CWB II (#344) and a metrical hymn setting (#345), which you can use.

I have included suggestions for music on ANZAC Day (Tuesday 25 April). ANZAC Day is an important day for us both on the civic and the liturgical calendar and so the liturgy should be enhanced by appropriate music. It has been declared as a National Day of Prayer by the Australian Bishops Conference. Hymn Suggestions are given on page 24.

At the end of this Newsletter I have included the music for a hymn for the Season of Easter, which can be sung throughout the Easter Season (see pages 27-29).

We continue to offer workshops to parish musicians and are happy to come and visit your parish if there is a liturgical music topic that you would like further instruction or support on. Please feel free to contact me (see contact details on page 27).

I have listed the workshops for March - May on page 3. You will see that later this month we will have a repeat workshop on the *Exsultet* and a repeat workshop on copyright. Yes, copyright is not the most interesting of topics, but it is one that we all need to keep reminding ourselves of and upskilling ourselves on as well. There are no workshops during April due to Holy Week and the school holidays. Our next set of workshops will be the Music Reading Course in May. This course is an introduction to the basic principles required to read music. We have found this course helpful to people in the past and so thought we would offer it again this year.

As we continue our Lenten journey in the desert with the Lord and we prepare music for the Holy Week liturgies, may we keep in mind that all we do is for God's glory and to help people pray and worship Almighty God.

REFLECTION

114. The treasure of sacred music is to be preserved and fostered with great care.

What does the preceding sentence from Sacrosanctum Concilium mean?

There is room for both traditional and contemporary music in our liturgy. Whether the music is traditional or contemporary it should help people pray and give fitting worship to God. We should not be worshipping ourselves in the texts or music chosen. If the music sounds like a secular idiom, for example country and western, rock or rap, then that music is not suitable for the liturgy. These are secular idioms and have their place in secular places, not the liturgy.

There are some people who think that because a piece of music is old, or because it is in Latin, we should not use it in the liturgy. They are incorrect. Likewise, there are those people who think that any piece of music written after the Second Vatican Council should not be used. They are incorrect also. The document on the liturgy from the Second Vatican Council - Sacrosanctum Concilium which we have been examining in this Newsletter and in particular the sentence above from article 114 calls us to use both traditional and contemporary music in the liturgy, but it must be suitable for us in the liturgy.

If we would like a guide on how to use both traditional and contemporary music in the liturgy then we should turn to Catholic Worship Book II, which is the approved hymnal for Australia by the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference, since that book provides for us the benchmark of the type and standard of music that we should be using in the liturgy. The hymnal contains both traditional and contemporary music. It also includes some music in Latin as well as some Gregorian Chant melodies with which we should be familiar.

If we look at the music for the Season of Lent contained in CWB II, we will find both traditional and contemporary music there. I will give two examples of each type of music to illustrate what the sentence above from SC is asking us to do as liturgical musicians.

The first example of traditional music (for Lent) is *Again we keep this solemn fast* (#285). The text of this hymn is a new translation of a hymn text by Saint Gregory the Great. The text advises us on how we can put into action the aspects of Lent - prayer, fasting and almsgiving. The melody is from a German chorale in the sixteenth century and harmonized by J. S. Bach (1685-1750).

Another example is the Gregorian chant melody of *Attende Domine* (Hear us, almighty Lord) (#292). The refrain text is given in both Latin and English and the verses are given in English. We may think that music with Latin texts has no place in the liturgy, but in actual fact article 36 from SC states: "the use of the Latin language is to be preserved in the Latin rite." So, yes there is room for both texts in Latin and the vernacular. Just as an aside, some of the Taizé chants have Latin refrains and we should not discount those either.

An example of a contemporary hymn contained in the hymnal for Lent is *Tree of Life* (#300). The text and tune of this hymn are by Marty Haugen and it includes general verses for the Lenten Season as well as verses that specific for each of the Sundays of Lent that correspond directly to the readings and prayers for that Sunday.

Another example of a contemporary hymn is *Bring us back to you, O Lord our God* (#287). This English text given in the hymnal is a translation from a French text and is based on the words of the Prophet Ezekiel. This text is appropriate for use during the Season of Lent as it is the Lord speaking to us telling us how He will bring us back to Him and His Ways.

So we can see from these four examples from CWB II, that both traditional and contemporary hymns can be used in the liturgy and that these examples given are suitable for use in the liturgy (in particular for the Season of Lent). They are suitable because the music is singable and leads us to holiness and the texts are appropriate reminding us of what we are called to do and be during the Season of Lent. They are also suitable because they help us fulfil what SC asks of us as liturgical musicians by preserving and fostering the treasure of liturgical music with great care.

The music suggestions included in this Newsletter have been chosen with this principle in mind. They include both traditional and contemporary pieces of music.
