(Bishop and Martyr) 5 June



About Saint Boniface (c. 675-754)

Saint Boniface was a member of a Benedictine Monastery in Devon (England) in about 675. He was elected as abbot, but resigned so that he could become a missionary. The pope gave him the name Boniface and sent him to Germany, where he served as a bishop for thirty years. He was sent there to evangelise the Germanic peoples.

He was ordained a bishop and given wide-ranging papal commissions throughout Germany and Gaul. He founded monasteries and established dioceses, presided at synods and maintained close associations with various emperors.

He is remembered as a determined missionary and as a church worker and reformer whose worked shaped the way for the future of the Church in Europe.

He was martyred by a band of pagans during Mass on Pentecost Sunday 754.

The hired man, since he is not the shepherd and the sheep do not belong to him, abandons the sheep and runs away as soon as he sees a wolf coming, and then the wolf attacks and scatters the sheep; this is because he is only a hired man and has no concern for the sheep.

'I am the good shepherd; I know my own and my own know me, just as the Father knows me and I know the Father; and I lay down my life for my sheep. And there are other sheep I have that are not of this fold, and these I have to lead as well. They too will listen to my voice, and there will be only one flock, and one shepherd.'
