About Saint Ephrem (306–373)

Saint Ephrem served as head of a cathedral school in Syria. When the Persians invaded his hometown of Nisibis, he fled to a cave near Edessa (known as Urfa today) to live the rest of his life as a monk. Edessa is located in south-east Turkey, once part of upper Mesopotamia on the frontier of the Syrian desert. While living an austere life that was marked by isolation and fasting, he wrote hundreds of hymns and commentaries on Sacred Scripture. His hymns and Scriptural commentaries provide a deep insight into the Paschal Mystery of Christ and also opposed the gnostic tendencies that pervaded during his lifetime. From time to time he would leave his cave to preach in Edessa. He drew in crowds of people by his eloquent preaching and therefore became known as "the harp of the Holy Spirit."

His preaching and hymns have spread far beyond the Syriac Church and are used in both the Eastern and Western Church alike.

Later in his life he was ordained a deacon and helped the people of Edessa to deal with a severe famine.

What can we learn from Saint Ephrem?

Saint Ephrem devoted his whole life to preaching and explaining Scripture, addressing the heresies that arose in his time. Not all of us are called to live a life of isolation, but Saint Ephrem does illustrate to us the importance of silence in our lives. In this day and age where people are running from one activity to another with a million thought processes going through their mind, we need to spend some each day in silence and stillness. Firstly, to allow us to process things, secondly, to be calm and thirdly, to allow us the opportunity to think about new things.

Saint Ephrem used his gifts and talents and we are called to do so as well. After becoming a Deacon, he helped the people of his town survive a famine. Deacons are ordained for service and Saint Ephrem certainly lived out that call. We too, are called to serve people in their time of need and to provide reassurance to people when they are anxious.

- 4. Later a Deacon he became, serving the people in his care, helping them when a famine came, lifting them up from their despair.
- 5. By the way which we live our lives may people come to know the Lord; following Him with greatest joy that their lives with Him e'er accord.
