INTRODUCTION

We are in the midst of Lent and on our way to celebrating Holy Week and Easter. I hope that the music you have been using in the liturgy for Lent has helped you and the people better understand what the Lord is asking of us during Lent and also helping everyone to prepare for Holy Week and Easter. Since we are now in the thick of Lent, I thought I would repeat my notes on Lent from the February Newsletter.

As Lent is a penitential season, the music we prepare for the liturgy during Lent should reflect this characteristic. Musical instruments should only be used to sustain singing with the exception of the Solemnities of Saint Patrick (Monday 18 March) and Saint Joseph (Tuesday 19 March) as well as the Fourth Sunday of Lent (*Laetare Sunday* – Sunday 10 March).

Given that musical instruments are to be used only to sustain singing with exception of the days mentioned in the previous paragraph, another way we can observe the simplicity of Lent in the liturgy is to not sing a recessional hymn but let the ministers of the liturgy and then the members of the gathered assembly depart in silence.

In Lent, the Alleluia is omitted at Mass and in the Liturgy of the Hours, even in the celebrations of solemnities and feasts. This also applies to the hymns used in the Liturgy. The Gospel Acclamation is replaced by one of these four acclamations:

- Praise to You, Lord Jesus Christ, king of endless glory!
- Praise and honour to You, Lord Jesus Christ!
- Glory and praise to You, Lord Jesus Christ!
- Glory to You, Word of God, Lord Jesus Christ!

(CWBII contains various settings of these acclamations (Numbers 54-61).)

Parishes with an active RCIA process should celebrate the Scrutinies on the Third, Fourth and Fifth Sundays of Lent. Suggestions for appropriate music are made in the hymn suggestions for those Sundays of Lent. Those parishes where Scrutinies are not taking place should follow the music suggestions for the Year B Cycle of readings. Parishes where the Scrutinies are celebrated should follow the Year A cycle of Readings and the suggestions that accompany that cycle of readings, as well as the suggestions for the particular Scrutiny rituals. (See pages 11-16.)

In the section on hymn suggestions, I have not given suggestions for Holy Week (including Easter Sunday). The hymnals have indices which cover Holy Week adequately, in particular CWB II (see Numbers 302-345). The Holy Week liturgies are very complex and there are several rituals within each liturgy. This is where CWB II is extremely helpful because it has music for each of these rituals.

There are a couple of points I would like to draw your attention to with regards to music for Holy Week. Alongside CWB II, the ICEL website contains the melodies for the Chants in the Holy Week Missal.

Another point to note is that the Sequence is obligatory on Easter Sunday. There is a Gregorian Chant setting in both English and Latin in CWB II (#344) and a metrical hymn setting (#345), which you can use.

I have included suggestions for music on ANZAC Day (Thursday 25 April). ANZAC Day is an important day for us both on the civic and the liturgical calendar and so the liturgy should be enhanced by appropriate music. It has been declared as a National Day of Prayer by the Australian Bishops Conference. Hymn Suggestions are given on page 23.

We continue to offer workshops to parish musicians and are happy to come and visit your parish if there is a liturgical music topic that you would like further instruction or support on. Please feel free to contact me (see contact details on page 26).

I have listed the workshops for March – June on page 3. There are no workshops during April due to Holy Week and the school holidays. Our next set of workshops will be the Music Reading Course in May. This course is an introduction to the basic principles required to read music. We have found this course helpful to people in the past and so thought we would offer it again this year.

As we continue our Lenten journey in the desert with the Lord and we prepare music for the Holy Week liturgies, may we keep in mind that all we do is for God's glory and to help people pray and worship Almighty God.

REFLECTION

121. Composers, filled with the Christian spirit, should feel that their vocation is to cultivate sacred music and increase its store of treasures.

Let them produce compositions which have the qualities proper to genuine sacred music, not confining themselves to works which can be sung only by large choirs, but providing also for the needs of small choirs and for the active participation of the entire assembly of the faithful.

What do the preceding paragraphs from *Sacrosanctum Concilium* mean?

Not everyone is called to compose texts and/or music for the liturgy. Sometimes, composers may compose a piece of music for a specific occasion, for example a parish jubilee. Perhaps before composers embark on the journey of composing new texts and/or music, it might be helpful to look and see if something already exists.

The above paragraphs again reinforce that concept that there is room for both congregational participation in the liturgy as well as for a choir to sing pieces on its own. Music that is to be sung by a congregation must be easy for people to learn, given that many people in the pews do not read music or play an instrument. So, two examples of music in the liturgy that come to mind are the response to the Responsorial Psalm and the Gospel Acclamation refrain.

Whilst there is the option to use seasonal Psalms in the Lectionary, if we are aiming to sing the Responsorial Psalm as it is in the Lectionary each Sunday then the responses for the people need to be tuneful and easy to learn after only hearing the response twice. I say twice, because the organist plays the refrain, then the cantor or choir intones it and then on the third time the people join in. If they cannot pick up the tune after two or three times the composer has not provided to the active participation of the entire assembly of the faithful. Some settings of the Responsorial Psalm repeat themselves in the Lectionary and others do not. So, to ensure that the repertoire builds up and is remembered these Responsorial Psalms can be used at other points in the liturgy for example at the Entrance, Offertory or Communion. People will become more familiar as they hear and join in them more often than once every three years.

Similarly, the Gospel Acclamation refrain needs to be easily learnt. That is a concept that is particularly pertinent now that we are during Lent. It really is not a good use of time to learn fancy settings of the Lenten Acclamations as they are only used at this time of year. It is better to have a set of four (one of each of the Acclamations) and repeat those each Lent.

With the Gospel Acclamation outside of Lent, it helps to build up the repertoire if there is a setting for each of the seasons for Advent, Christmas and Easter and then a couple of settings for the months of Ordinary Time. Repeating these settings ensures that the people will become familiar with them, rightfully join in what is theirs to sing at Mass and that the composers have been able to ensure the active participation of the people.
